Don't Be Afraid...Go and Tell

The angel [at Jesus' empty tomb] said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you seek Jesus who was crucified. He is not here, for He has risen, as He said. Come, see the place where He lay. Then go quickly and tell His disciples that He has risen from the dead, and behold, He is going before you to Galilee; there you will see Him. See, I have told you." Holding it in his closed hand, the father waited for the inevitable sting. And sure enough, the wasp let him have it. As the little girl still saw the "bee" in the car, she started to panic again "Daddy, it's going to sting me." However, the father gently responded, "No honey, he's not going to sting you now. Look at my hand."

Throughout this Lenten season, we have been learning what the hand of the Lord did and continues to do for us.
